4.1	Minutes of the meeting held 5 May 2021 Minutes of last meeting on 5 May 2021 were proposed James Elward, seconded Helen Meyrick, approved nem con.

4.2	Reports Reports of all church activities are available in the Year Review. Thanks to Kate Lockwood and Richard Young for producing the review, and to everyone who contributed. Copies are available in churches and on the website.	
4.2.1	 Proceedings of the PCC in previous year Since the last APCM in May 2021 the PCC has held seven meetings. The PCC has worked alongside the ministry team, to ensure the safe re-opening of our churches for private prayer and regular worship. Covid Risk assessments have been regularly updated, in line with C of E guidance. The PCC endorsed the appointment of an Ecumenical Pioneering Minister; and a sixth place of worship has been established within the benefice at Windrush Place. The PCC has appointed a Schools Chaplain and Youth worker The PCC has overseen the instigation of an Anna Chaplaincy within the benefice, The PCC has adopted the C of E online Parish Dashboard to assist in monitoring safeguarding practices. The PCC reflected on recent C of E reports highlighting safeguarding concerns with a view to ensuring the parish follows best practice. Faculty applications were submitted for icons and St Mary's and for work at St John's Hailey. The PCC has responded to Natasha's Law, aimed at improving information about food allergens. A new architect has been appointed to conduct quinquennial inspections and to oversee improved accessibility and roof repairs at Holy Trinity.

	 The PCC has worked with the Commonwealth War Graves Commission to have signs installed showing the presence of war graves in our churchyards at St John's Hailey, Holy Trinity and Crawley The Safeguarding Policy has been revised for 2022. The Volunteers Policy; Health & Safety Policy; and Disciplinary & Grievance Procedures have all been reviewed.

4.2.2	 Safeguarding Over the last year the parish has continued to develop its safeguarding practices. As our buildings gradually reopened and we met more face to face, we have reviewed and updated our policies to ensure they are as relevant as possible. We have also continued to review our online policies as many activities are still held this way. Training for all PCC/DCC members, children's workers, pastoral visitors, and other roles, has taken place online using the C of E's new training materials. Courses covered include basic, foundation and leadership modules, safer recruitment and domestic abuse. Concerns have continued to be reported and dealt with as needed. The PCC has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy
	Discipline Measure 2016.
	 Risk assessments, including for Covid, have been reviewed and put in place as we gradually reopened.
	Thanks to Alison and her team. Safeguarding duties are increasingly onerous.
4.2.3	 Annual Fabric Report An extraordinary amount has been achieved, given the restrictions that have taken place this year. St Mary the Virgin, Witney In contrast with the previous year, 2021 saw a significantly reduced requirement for ad hoc maintenance in St Mary's. Theft of some lead flashing around the toilet block and South Aisle, has now been replaced. We have increased the frequency of gutter clearance to stop a build-up of debris in the gutters and down pipes, causing excess rainwater to overflow the flashing, and flood into the building. We have upgraded the internal notice boards to present much more attractive and informative information regarding the Ministry Team and some of our current key initiatives. We continue to be hugely grateful for the work of the volunteers who regularly turn up for church cleaning and ad hoc maintenance, without whom the fabric of the church would easily fall into disrepair.
	Holy Trinity Church
	 There are no major works to report this year. All the gutters have been cleaned and churchyard maintenance carried out. The organ has been tuned and repaired The annual servicing of fire extinguishers, boiler and heaters and PAT testing completed. Minor fault with lights not turning off. They have been replaced with reconditioned unit. Plans are underway for the new north roof together with improving facilities for the disabled. The Quinquennial Inspection will be in April. Further slates off the roof on both north and south sides along with trees shedding minor branches, some dead wood and some not. The council will be approached again to review the proximity of trees and the new architect, Peter Preston, will include his professional opinion on this in the QI.

4.2.3 contd	 St. John the Evangelist, Hailey Doors and panels all fit, slide, and close once again. Routine PAT testing fire extinguisher servicing were all carried out. Another tile fell out and was replaced, and a recent shower has shown up a leak in the guttering but it is in hand. The basement has remained free of flooding. We have achieved the Bronze Eco Church award We had a snowdrop project and many hundreds were planted along the pathway. Our neighbours in Yew Tree Cottage had some work done to their cottage and asked to knock a hole in the adjoining wall to go back and forth to the road rather than through the house. The building work is practically finished, and the builder will block off the hole in the wall and the stone mason will finish the repairs to the wall shortly.
	 In the autumn we had another churchyard tidy up
	 St John the Baptist, Curbridge The church building is in generally fair condition. The quinquennial inspection took place seven months ago but we still await the written report from the surveyor. Some tiles need to be reset on the roof, but parishioners have undertaken gully clearing themselves. A roof leak has also been dealt with by the same means. Small areas of paintwork are in urgent need of redecoration. A recent electrical inspection identified three items in need of repair and replacement; these have been undertaken and a fully satisfactory certificate of safety has been issued. The church path is degrading and will need repairs in the mid-term future.
4.2.4	 Finance and Statement of accounts We are exceptionally grateful for the generosity of our congregations during 2021, which has allowed us to end the year with strong cash balances. However, the majority of the bank account balances held by the Parish at the end of 2021 were Restricted and not available to fund our on-going ministry. With reported Cash Balances totalling £165,785 the Parish appeared to be exceptionally well funded as at the end of 2021 However, of these balances, £116,688 were Restricted, and are therefore not available to cover the day to expenses of running the Parish. 

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
- Of the £49,097 Unrestricted Funds, only £16,546 was available to the Parish to fund our day-to-day ministry expenditure, the remainder being held by the DCCs to cover ad hoc maintenance expenses (or designated by HT DCC for their roof appeal)
- £16,546 is equivalent to just 28 days of our day-to-day costs.

Unrestricted Bank Balances as at 31st December 2021




- The income for the year ended 31st December 2021 totalled £332,665, with total expenditure of £241,851, resulting in a substantial surplus of £90,814. These figures include Restricted and Unrestricted Funds
- However, unrestricted income totalled £215,917, while costs amounted to £210,880. These figures include some small accounting adjustments to eradicate historic balance sheet anomalies

- Excluding these adjustments, the Parish achieved a small operating surplus of £2,262 in 2021. (2020 deficit £12,843). The improvement in this outturn largely reflects a substantial reduction in the need for ad hoc maintenance across our churches in the year
- The breakdown of unrestricted income and costs is shown above. Regular congregational giving covers 54% of our costs. This rises to 89% if income from ad hoc donations and grants is included
- However, our regular congregational giving is down from 2020 by approximately £3,000
- As regular congregational giving only covers just over half of our ongoing costs, there remains a significant risk that we will not be able to cover our core ministry costs for 2022 without a continued Appeal to our congregation for financial support.





Only 2 pages of the Year Review relate to finance but it underpins everything that happens in the parish.

We have an increasingly broad ministry because of the generosity of many people. We have received a substantial legacy from Dennis Woodhams, to whom we are very grateful. The vast majority of restricted funds can only be spent in line with the wishes of the donor.

2022

Last year we covered 54% of our costs from congregational giving (Parish Giving Scheme, envelope scheme, loose plate collections, contactless device at St Mary's, Gift Aid). This is not sufficient for financial stability.

The Food & Drink Festival is the only festival in 2022 that raises money for the Parish funds. The Beer Festival can only be used to support maintenance of the building, and Witney Feast raises funds for St Mary's DCC.

There will be another appeal this year. The emphasis will be on encouraging people to increase regular giving to match one-off donations given for previous appeals. Previous appeals have asked for an average of £350/person to make up the deficit.

The consequences of not being able to raise sufficient funds will mean an inability to heat the buildings; pay expenses; or default on the parish share – which has future implications for being able to afford 2 ministers as part of the ministry team. It is anticipated that heating costs may increase to £30k.

Current giving averages £70-£80/person each month. We're hugely grateful for all donations.

Other methods for increasing giving:

- Promote the PGS to new members
- Reinstate welcome evenings for people new to the parish
- Reinstate passing the collection plate round at services
- Have someone holding the collection plate at weddings
- Considering another Christmas Tree festival.

Thanks were expressed to Jeremy for all he does as treasurer and Churchwarden.

4.2.7	Deanery Synod Report Meetings were held on $23^{\rm rd}$ March and $2^{\rm nd}$ September on Zoom and on $17^{\rm th}$ November at North Leigh in person and on Zoom.
	Coming out of Covid: (March meeting) Churches reported that they had been using a variety of live streamed services but were starting to return to in-person services. The Rev'd Canon Toby Wright reported that he'd had a few services in church but mainly used Zoom. The services have included an organist with a church organ in his own home and his wife to lead the singing of hymns; the words being displayed on screen.



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4.2.7 contd	Although members of congregation without suitable technology had been lost to some extent, many others had joined in who were housebound, from care homes, or from distant places.
	 The Contemplative Toolkit: (September meeting) The Rev'd Charlie Kerr, School Chaplaincy Advisor for the Oxford Diocesan Board of Education, spoke about resources to deal with anxiety, mental health and a lack of spirituality in schools since the pandemic. Appointments The Rev'd Dr Tess Kuin Lawton moved from being Area Dean to a new post as Canon Missioner at Winchester Cathedral. The Rev'd Margaret Dixon was licensed as Area Dean by Bishop Gavin Collins at North Leigh, with The Rev'd Simon Kirby and The Rev'd Janice Collier as Associate Deans. The Rev'd Miles Welbourne is Curate at Bampton with a special interest in rural work, children's work and technology. Laverne Williams is working as Youth Leader and Schools Chaplain for 11 schools, based at St Mary's Witney. The Rev'd Canon Toby Wright was elected to General Synod from the Oxford Diocese. Finance The Deanery share has been paid.
